Carolina Mills Employees' Credit Union

Awarded Top Five-Star Rating

Carolina Mills Employees' Credit Union has been awarded a five-star rating. This prestigious award identifies this institution as one of the safest, most credit-worthy credit unions in the United States.

The award is based on a zero- to five-star rating assigned by Bauer Financial Reports, Inc. based on its analysis of the June 30, 1990 financial data as filed with federal regulators.

A five-star rating for the safest credit unions in the country indicates that the credit union's deposits are federally insured up to \$100,000 per account, that its regulatory capital exceeds nine percent of assets, that there are no excessive delinquent loans or repossessed assets and that the credit union is operating profitably or posted an insignificant loss for the period. Out of a total of 13,971 credit unions reporting, only 3,690, or 26.4 percent, received a five-star rating.

The credit union received a personalized award certificate to display on their premises in recognition of their achievement.

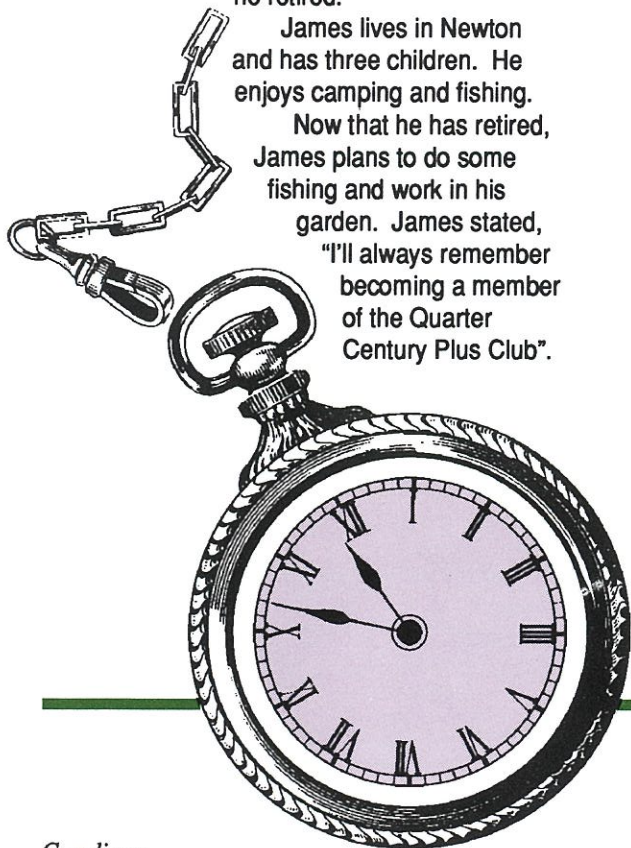


James Dula Retiree

Now that he has retired, James plans to do some fishing and work in his garden. James stated, "I'll always remember becoming a member of the Quarter Century Plus Club".



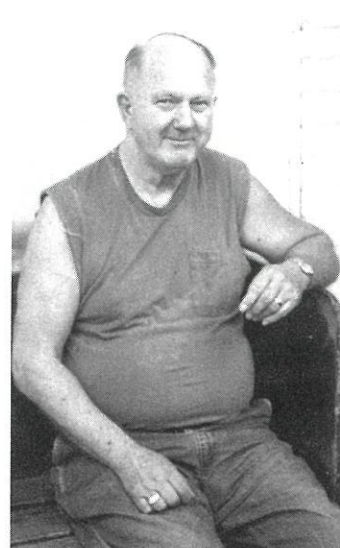
Dorothy Feimster Retiree

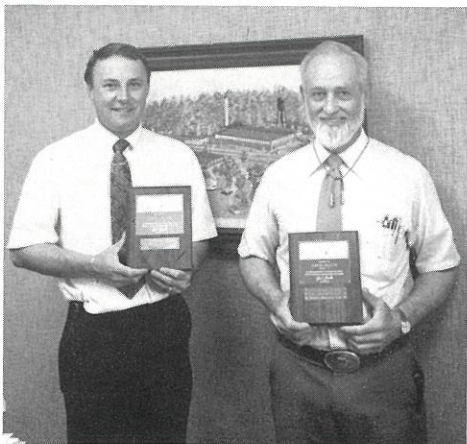

Carolina Mills Plant Nos. 5 & 6 were awarded for the seventh consecutive year the North Carolina Department of Labor Safety Awards. These awards recognize firms which have maintained either a perfect safety record for the year or recorded an occupational injury incidence rate (lost workday cases) at least 50 percent below the statewide average for their particular industry group. In addition, the firms must have 10 or more employees and no on-the-job fatalities during a calendar year.

The awards were presented by James Oppold, Director of North Carolina Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Division, at the awards banquet on March 26, 1991.

The banquet was co-sponsored by the Lincoln-ton-Lincoln County Chamber of Commerce and the N. C. Department of Labor.

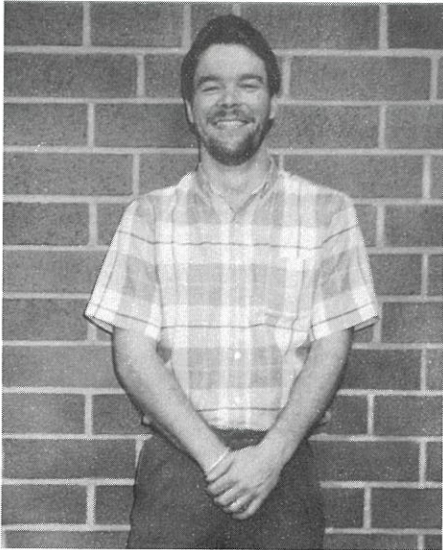
